Boise Little Theater ...

Boise Little Theater was organized in the spring of 1948 by Harold Wennstrom, Miss Mildred Selby and Mrs. Frank Marler.

Its first production was "Arsenic and Old Lace" put on in the Old Pinney Theater, August 17, 1948.

The Steering Committee was elected at the February and March meetings. This committee was composed of Grant Ambrose, Frank Parcher, Mr. and Mrs. Art Le Tourneau, Mrs. Willis Sullivan, Mrs. Roy Maxey, Mrs. Fritz Hummel, Lumir Gerner, Joe Maggio, John Voulkos, Louis Pacheco, Arthur Mazzola, Mrs. John (Ann) Hawkes, Mrs. Harry Marsh, Mrs. Robert Hamersley, Mrs. Frank Marler, Harold Wennstrom, Miss Elizabeth Williams, Mrs. Lester Randolph, Mrs. Leonard Abrahams and Hugh Hough.



The Steering Committee appointed a Board of Regents to act as the governing body of the organization. Grant Ambrose was the chairman of this board. Because of high overhead in rent, props and etc., the members felt they needed their own building and thus rented one of the old theater buildings at Gowen Field. The first seating in their new building were some old seats found in Emmett (installed by the membership), folding chairs, benches, rocking chairs and whatever else would fit into the auditorium. The second play "You Can't Take It With You" played three nights to a sold out house and reviews were good. Hugh Hough was elected the first president, he also acted as business manager and handy man.

That summer they had a picnic to choose best actors and actresses of the year. This started the Beulah awards (our equivalent of Hollywood's Oscar). First Beulah winners were Sandra Price, Joyce Howard, Walter Williams and Don Bish

At that time BLT was paying their director but decided that in order to cut expenses he should be a volunteer along with the rest of the workers. Beginning in January of 1951 they had a new director for each play. That year ended with all bills paid, money in the bank and a bright future.

Beginning in 1951-52 a special format for the program was designed by Maurice Perry which we still use today. During the 1952-53 season the schedule was extended to five plays running four performances each.

Boise Junior Little Theater was started in 1953 under the presidency of Nathan Scott during the off-season. Their first play was "Charley's Aunt", July 30.

In the 1955-56 season a theater workshop was started to educate people in theater work, such as make-up, stage design, acting, directing, voice projection, etc.

On the opening night of the 5th season on May 16, 1956 a fire broke out during the play. We lost our theater and two members lost their lives, George McKean and Justice Craycroft. Through determination to keep going, the generosity of many townspeople, a couple of Angels, \$100 donations from working members and insurance we decided to build our own theater and to keep going the following year in temporary quarters.

The 1956-57 season opened on schedule in the Boise High School Auditorium with a production of "Sabrina Fair."

On April 16, 1957, we broke ground for our new Theater on Fort Street, on the Boise Barracks site. It was designed by Art Troutner and Harold G. Thompson. Theater members worked day and night through the summer laying bricks and concrete blocks, pouring cement and pounding nails, building inch by inch our new home. Our first Beaux Arts Ball was held in the Elks building that year.

On October 2, 1957, we opened our year in our new theater with "High Tor."

By the 1958-59 season we were producing six plays, five nights a play.

This year being the first of "Gold Rush Days" at Idaho City, the Little Theater produced a melodrama, "Curse of an Aching Heart" at Idaho City, June 20 and 21, 1959.

Beginning in 1950 we participated in Music Week productions. Our members have been called upon to help with many other productions such as the Operas and the first few plays of the Musical Productions, incorporated. In the late '50's a new Boise Junior Little Theater was started with Mrs. Vern Tregaskis as chairman.

Each summer the Theater holds a pincic in the park, usually in July, following the tradition established in 1949, at which the first Buelahs were awarded.

In December of the 1970-71 season BLT started the Children's shows, beginning with "The Elves and the Shoemaker." Started producing Melodramas at the Western Idaho Fair in 1973 with "The Streets of Boise", bringing to life the settings in the Historical Museum and giving out the Cameo Awards, won that year by Merrill Hansen and Bunny Gunter.
